FHF will hold its second annual seminar focused on helping families through the holidays after a loss. The seminar will be November 14 at Shandon Baptist Church in Columbia and is open to all members free of charge.

Last year, FHF held “Coping With the Holidays:” a Hope and Healing seminar to give families practical tips to help them navigate the season when it seems that everyone is celebrating.

Linda Gill, from Joy in the Mourning, hosted the workshop.

“We felt this should become an annual event after the feedback we received last year,” FHF Coordinator Faith Turner said. “Reaching those first holidays and milestones can be a struggle for families. We want to provide them with some tools to help them

cope with this time.”

This seminar was created to address the particular bereavement issues that accompany the holiday season, which can stretch from November through January, and offer suggestions for healthy ways to cope.

Additionally, the workshop will address special occasions such as birthdays, date of death anniversaries etc. that come throughout the year.

Geoffrey Williams, of The Counseling Center at Palmetto Health Baptist, will run the seminar. Williams is a Licensed Professional Counselor with a Masters in Rehabilitation Counseling.

He is currently the manager of the Day Treatment Program at The Counseling Center at Palmetto Health Baptist in Columbia where he has provided care to various populations during a 14 year tenure with the hospital.

He will be joined by **Amy Dixon** who facilitates counseling, music therapy and creative arts' group at The Counseling Center.

FHF grant ends: SCHP hires Turner to continue program

The Families of Highway Fatalities' program will continue uninterrupted after the federal grant that funded the program ended in September. The Highway Patrol has hired Faith Turner to continue as coordinator for the program.

The South Carolina Highway Patrol was awarded a three-year grant in 2006 for the program. Ms. Turner was hired to coordinate the program on a temporary grant basis. When the grant ended, the Highway Patrol had the option of continuing the program using state funds.

“We have seen so many families benefit from this program and they — in turn — have helped us educate the public about highway safety issues,” said Highway Patrol Col. Kenny Lancaster Jr. “We are pleased to be able to continue this valuable program and are encouraging other state patrols to consider adopting a similar program.”

Ms. Turner has been with the Highway Patrol since 2007. She plans to expand the program by formalizing the regional groups so that more activities are available on a local basis.

“I am amazed by how much the program has grown in the past couple of years,” Ms. Turner said. “I believe new families are drawn to this program because of the wonderful support they get from other families who have ‘been there.’”

Teenager makes little girl's dream to fly come true

"Grandma, I want to fly in a plane and go tell God that I am ready for my Daddy to come home." These words spoken last Thanksgiving by my 5-year-old granddaughter, Tatiana, struck a cord in my heart.

Tatiana's father, Julian Alfred Weston, died in a single-vehicle collision in 2006.

Not long after her words to me, I spoke to a group of young people at a church in Orangeburg about making safety a choice. I shared Tatiana's words and told the teens about how my son, Julian Alfred Weston, was born on his dad's birthday and died on his mom's.

I asked them to remember the words of a mother who had lost her son in a one-car collision because he wasn't wearing a seat belt. I reminded them that those of us left behind still feel the pain of missing him – none so much as his daughter.

After I finished my presentation, a 16-year-old young lady named Courtney asked if Tatiana had been on her first flight. I told her she had not.

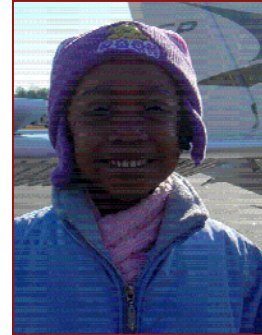
Courtney told me that she and her parents might be able to make that happen. She said that her father had a two seater-plane and that maybe he could take Tatiana on a flight. I felt humbled at such a wonderful, heartfelt gesture.

Before I reached home, Courtney's mother had called and left me a message. She said her daughter was excited about making Tatiana's dream of flight a reality.

A day later when Courtney's mom, Aimee, and I made contact, she told me that Courtney was so touched by my story that she called home from the church parking lot.

Courtney told her that she was putting on her seat belt and wanted them to take Tatiana on her first flight. We made arrangements for the flight to take place on the day after what would have been Tatiana's father's 26th birthday.

Tatiana's first flight lasted about 35 minutes.

John, Courtney's father, said that she never spoke a word, but that her eyes and facial expressions spoke volumes.

Aimee and John presented Tatiana with a miniature plane and a certificate of her flight. Courtney bought Tatiana a gift, wrapped it, and called to ask us to bring Tatiana back to the airport on Sunday when Santa would deliver her present and call her by name.

The Godwin family will never know what this gift meant to my granddaughter and to all of us as we struggle with Julian's death.

As we approach the holiday season, I am reminded of how blessed we are to meet people like the Godwins who have raised a daughter with a heart for helping others.

FHF sponsors teen safety forum in Kershaw County

The Families of Highway Fatalities sponsored a teen safety forum on September 23 in Kershaw County.

As of October 25, 17 people have died on Kershaw County roadways compared to 11 last year.

Several FHF members lost teen drivers on these rural roadways. They decided to address this issue by bringing area parents and teens together to seek solutions to the growing problem.

The forum involved Kershaw

Health Resource Center, Kershaw County Sheriff's Office and the Highway Patrol.

The Highway Patrol used its DUI goggles and obstacle course to illustrate the effect alcohol has on your senses. The parents had a chance to interact with a panel of experts about teen driving behaviors and warning signs.

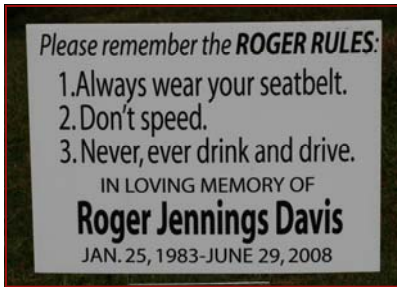
